It began with "For the Happiness of All the Children"

Children will Unlock the Future of the Planet

The environment surrounding children has become progressively more severe with the increase in abnormal weather, natural disasters, terrorism, and conflicts. It is our responsibility as adults to foster a wholesome environment for children. The role of women and mothers is particularly important, as mothers possess the instinct to protect their children.

Mothers who spare neither money nor their lives to secure their children's well-being and give them undivided love and care are now required to join forces and cooperate for

their children's growth. Educational background, wealth and poverty are irrelevant when it comes to the love we have for our children.

However, there are many children who are forced to live in difficult circumstances due to financial and social reasons.

For children, borders, religion, and politics do not matter. We have invited the First Ladies of each nation to participate in this event because they are the mothers of their respective nations. The children of these countries are just as important to the First Ladies as their own children.

Summit for the Children by the "Mother of Nation"

The "1st Asia Pacific Africa Women's Economic Exchange Summit" is truly a "Summit for the Children" by the "Mother of the Nation." The First Ladies who participated in the Summit emphasized the importance of cooperation, stating, "If the mothers of each nation collaborate, they can become a great power. We can accomplish anything." However, the global situation forced us to postpone the conference three times, and I am overwhelmed with regret that there were more lives that could have been saved.

The pandemic spread across the globe over three years, delaying this Summit, which was originally scheduled for 2019, to be held in 2022. During that time, Africa faced a food crisis due to an attack by desert locusts. The First Ladies of Africa sent a letter to our Association. Under the

guidance of Mr. Toshihiro Nikai, Secretary-General, and with the cooperation of the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Japan, as a nation, promptly provided emergency aid with the TICAD7 budget.

First Ladies Who Wished to See the Summit Put Into Practice in their Respective Nations

As the Summit's organizer, my objectives were (1) to increase future food self-sufficiency for the children of Asia Pacific Africa and (2) to promote mutual cooperation in the face of global climate change. After World War Japan's national focus on providing school lunches resulted in significant improvements in the growth of malnourished children at the time. It is important to discuss improving school lunches and securing safe drinking water in Africa as well. Hoping that this would lead to more concrete discussions, we included special classes and school lunch experiences at elementary schools in this Summit for the visiting First Ladies.



Origin of Activities Uganda 2007

The First Ladies stated, "We want to create an

environment where children have access to safe and clean water, at least while they are at school, so they can get water at school, bring it home, and drink it there." This is because some children cannot attend school, procuring water from distant locations is time-consuming, and some children are abducted while fetching water.

The Collaboration of the First Lady Will Save the Children

For children, borders, religion, and politics do not matter.

The Joint Declaration and public announcement of the First Ladies as the "Mothers of the Nation" at this Summit served as a powerful catalyst for the next step in ensuring the well-being of children.

During the meeting with Prime Minister Fumio Kishida, he expressed to the First Ladies, "There is an urgent need for international cooperation, addressing the global food crisis, and providing assistance for women and children. The Japanese government remains committed to protecting women and children." The First Ladies were deeply moved by the meeting and expressed their heartfelt gratitude for its meaningfulness, which gave them renewed hope for the children in their respective countries.

The desire to hold a summit for children originated with an official visit with Mr. Sadakazu Tanigaki, and it was subsequently supported by the decision of Prime Minister Shinzo Abe and Secretary-General Toshihiro Nikai to hold this significant event.

Prime Ministers Yoshihide Suga and Fumio Kishida further facilitated the Summit's execution. This demonstrates the high value that Japan places on its children. I am sincerely grateful to all those involved. As I mentioned earlier, I want to express my gratitude to the First Ladies, who, despite being unable to attend this year's event due to scheduling conflicts, have shown great understanding despite the multiple postponements.


Abstract

Declaration entitled 'Nutrition for All: Ten-Point Commitment to Realize Human Security'. In addition, we launched the Coalition for African Rice Development (CARD), an initiative aimed at doubling rice production in Africa, now active in 32 countries, including Uganda and Zambia. Concrete actions include the dispatch of agricultural planning advisers, sustainable use and operation of irrigation systems, and the planning of rice development programs. We believe that JICA has effectively helped lay the foundation for substantial increases in rice production with the involvement of women in Tanzania, with training sessions held across the country since the



1970s covering a wide range of topics related to rice





Rice has become established as a cash crop and ranks third in Africa in production. Tanzania now exports rice to neighboring countries.



With enhanced cooperation in Africa on food and nutrition, JICA will:

ensure that people in Africa have access to nutritionally adequate food; help protect children who will be responsible for the future; and further promote women's empowerment.


Planting Seeds in Africa and Bringing Smiles with Rice

Abstract

Prime Minister Yasuo Fukuda set a goal at TICAD 4 in 2008 to double rice production in Africa within ten years, which was accomplished in 2018. The New Rice for Africa (NERICA), a land rice created from crossbreeding Asian and African rice, has contributed to this doubling of yield. NERICA consists of 18 varieties, with NERICA 4 being the most popular. NERICA has more enormous panicles, with almost twice as many grains per panicle as traditional upland rice varieties, resulting in higher yields. Additionally, it can be harvested in a relatively short period of approximately 115 days after sowing. NERICA cultivation requires at least 20mm of rainfall over five days. NERICA can be grown in upland fields without a rice paddy, and it is as simple as sowing and covering the soil without requiring the production of seedlings or the need for transplanting. Furthermore, rice grows well even in flooded areas during the rainy season.




The Key is to Maintain Soil Moisture.

Various trials in Uganda have demonstrated that terraces (terraced fields) on slopes help retain soil moisture by preventing precipitation from flowing downhill.



The difference in yield between terraced and unterraced fields is more than double.

Uganda's Agricultural Land, from 1,500 to 53,000 Hectares



The graph shows that the area planted with upland rice increased from 1,500 hectares in 2004 to 53,000 hectares in 2009. In addition, areas where neither field crops nor rice was cultivated during the rainy season when we visited Ethiopia in 2004 were transformed into NERICA fields in 2013, as shown in the photo below.



Africa Has 240 million Hectares of Wetland.

Of that area, 40 million hectares are fit for rice production. Training local farmers to cultivate rice will increase rice production. This will require Japan to continue its support for rice cultivation.

Ms. Nakamori, the Vice-Chair, says she still remembers how fifteen years ago, Mr. Tsuboi told Mr. Tanigaki that he would do his best to increase rice production on behalf of Japan while pointing to "NERICA rice" that was being grown in the pilot field in Uganda. In 2022, he told Ms. Nakamori that even if Japan supports new rice varieties, fertilizers, and irrigation equipment, rice cultivation will not spread or take root in Africa unless Japan provides farmers with training in cultivation techniques."



The introduction of school lunch programs was a crucial step in improving the nutritional status of children. In Japan, school lunches prioritize safety and security, and the daily menus are carefully designed to meet the dietary needs of children at each developmental stage.

They remarked, "From a young age, the Japanese have the custom of cleaning up the classrooms they use at school.

Safe Water for Children at School

Access to clean water is a primary concern for many African nations. Representatives from various African embassies in Japan emphasized the importance of providing children with access to clean water to prevent infectious diseases. They shared concerns such as children being unable to attend school due to water-fetching duties, high child mortality rates resulting from drinking contaminated water, and the lack of access to safe drinking water in rural areas.

The Japanese-made Filters which Eliminates Pathogens, has size of 0.2 Microns



In Africa, numerous small villages face various challenges, including inadequate water quality, even in areas with water sources and desert regions. However, Japanese engineers are eager to provide support. We have prepared three devices to



demonstrate how to obtain potable water from the air, deliver clean water using filters, and produce fresh water from seawater. As an example, water from a municipal pond was extracted and filtered using Japanese filters, known for their exceptional ability to remove microorganisms such as cholera bacteria. The resulting water, now safe to drink, was tasted before the First Ladies. This demonstration prompted questions about the amount of water that can be secured, the associated costs, and the requirements for electricity.

where we planted the trees, is a valuable green space left in the suburb on the outskirts of Tokyo. Its use is not restricted to agriculture; it is a place where residents can come to enjoy nature, and the area also plays a major role in flood control. With such history and functions, I consider it very meaningful that the tree-planting event took place in Minuma Rice Paddies. In closing, I would like to express my sincere wishes for the development of each country in Africa, and for the further strengthening of Japan-Africa relationships.

Creating "Rich Soil" No Flies

Leftover food, manure, and weeds have been used as valuable fertilizers for the fields since ancient times. In the past, composting techniques required about a year, but now they can be completed in a much shorter period. By incorporating the aforementioned leftover food and other materials into the soil and introducing bacteria, a useful field soil can be produced in just 20 to 25 days. In a 300 square meters space (100 m x 3 m = 300 m²), there are only a few flies, if any. The wholesome fields required for a nutritious harvest must be utilized to their full potential, particularly in light of the available natural forage. Due to COVID-19, we were not permitted to leave Tokyo to visit the site, so we presented with video coverage, which we have partially included in this Publication.

"Since assuming the role of First Lady, I have taken the initiative to implement school meals. My vision is to see this school cafeteria program expanded throughout the entire nation. I am also eager to learn from the expertise and know-how of Japanese school meals."

In the mid-1980s, Uganda emerged from a period of turmoil and conflict. The First Lady was deeply moved by the plight of orphans and initiated the

Uganda Women's Effort to Save Orphans (UWESO) to unite women from all walks of life in providing assistance. She played a critical role in improving the welfare of these children and bringing hope to them by providing meals, tuition fees and a home where they would find peace, love, and comfort.

Reform of Food from Zero to Everything

I would also like to share the experience of the work of the First Lady that she did during her leadership as the Minister responsible for Karamoja Affairs in the government of Uganda. "Karamoja, a remote rural region in Uganda, faced severe agricultural conditions, a lack of supplies and technology, and recurring droughts, leading to chronic food shortages. The government took bold action by investing in sustainable development initiatives. They provided agricultural tools, guidance, and promoted the cultivation of crops suitable for tractor-tilled soil, resulting in remarkable outcomes. Within a year, the number of vulnerable households decreased from 65%

to 34%, and it further declined to 20% the following year. Over the course of three years, the percentage dropped to 10%. This measure was implemented from 2011 to 2016. As food security improved, fewer children dropped out of school. Our goal is to ensure the health of children and empower mothers to be confident and proud of their work."

Significant progress was made, but unfortunately, it has been rolled back due to the impact of COVID-19 and prolonged drought periods.

Let's Collaborate Closely

"Uganda currently hosts approximately 1.5 million refugees from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Sudan, and other countries. With the ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine, the number of refugees worldwide is expected to rise. It is crucial that we provide food and education for refugee children. We

call upon Japan to support refugee programs, offering their expertise, as the demand for such assistance is likely to increase globally. Let us collaborate to achieve food security and education, establish a sustainable society, eradicate poverty and hunger, and work towards global gender equality."

In conclusion, I express my gratitude to the convenors of this engagement for providing an excellent opportunity to address food insecurity and challenges affecting children. I appreciate the unity we have as leaders and as mothers. Additionally, I acknowledge the efforts of the Chairperson in reaching out to us. To the Excellencies and distinguished guests, I commend your support for the development of women and children in your nations. May God bless you all.

The Futures of Children Connected by the Mother of the Nation

Vice-Chairperson Nakamori

Thank you for successfully chairing the "1st Asia Pacific Africa Women's Economic Exchange Summit" over the course of two days. Despite some challenging moments during the discussions, the First Ladies expressed

their utmost satisfaction with your exemplary management of the proceedings. Each country extended their congratulations to you for your outstanding chairmanship.

Chairperson Hashimoto

While the presentations by each country proceeded smoothly without much commotion, the discussions on the second day became truly intense. It made me realize that a First Lady holds a statesperson's position in her own right. Perhaps, the Presidents of each country had provided some guidance.

Nakamori

Prior to addressing the First Ladies, Mr. Ichiro Aisawa (Chairman of Japan-African Union Parliamentarians for Friendship) asked me in surprise, "Are all First Ladies this articulate?"

Hashimoto

Mr. Aisawa contacted me before the Summit and said, "There will be an exchange of opinions between the First Ladies of Africa and the Japan-African Union Parliamentarians for Friendship, and I would like you to attend." I replied, "As a matter of fact, I am the chairman of the Summit," and he laughed.

The Signing of the Joint Declaration

Nakamori

The Joint Declaration was shared with each country in advance as a proposed plan. However, discrepancies in the interpretation of certain terms led to conflicting claims among participating countries.

Hashimoto

As Chairperson, I initially followed the programmed agenda. However, with the multitude of perspectives being expressed, I realized that I needed to speak from my position as a parliament member to bring the discussions to a resolution.

Nakamori

That's why I emphasized the "significance of this summit" from the Chair's seat. I believe the intense discussions stemmed from the high expectations of the First Ladies and their genuine desire for meaningful exchanges. Consequently, the depth of the Summit's content increased.

Hashimoto

Initially, each country shared their current status and hopes as the "mother of the nation." However, on the second day, opinions expanded, diversifying from the perspective of each country. I was surprised to see government officials and experts from each country sitting beside the First Ladies with serious expressions, actively engaging with the audience and not being interrupted anymore (laughter).

Vice-Chairperson Fukuyo Nakamori

Former member of the House of Representatives; Chairperson, Asia Pacific Africa Women's Economic Exchange Association; Member, Ogasawara Islands Promotion and Development Council, Ministry of Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism; Founder of Community Safety Division

Nakamori

I was determined to ensure that all participants signed the Joint Declaration even if it meant extending the meeting time if necessary. When we exceeded the allocated time by an hour and twenty minutes, you asked me to pause the discussions, and we took a break in the conference room. What were your thoughts at that moment?

Hashimoto

I shared the same sentiment. Even a single word can be interpreted differently depending on how it is understood. That's why I believed it was best to thoroughly discuss the matter without worrying about time constraints. I made a spontaneous decision to allow them to speak freely and express their thoughts to their heart's content. To be honest, if it were an official meeting, we might not have been able to do that, and I would have concluded the meeting once the purpose was clear in the statement.

Nakamori

It was indeed a significant discussion, with explicit remarks and thoughts voiced as "the Mother of the Nation." As a result, everyone left feeling pleased, and we achieved our goal of having everyone sign the Joint Declaration.

Support Requires Ingenuity

Hashimoto

During my time as an athlete, I had the opportunity to travel through Kenya on a motorcycle alongside athletes from around the world for a television project. This experience, combined with my role as State Minister of Foreign Affairs, reinforced my belief that supporting individuals is more crucial than material possessions. In the context of Official Development Assistance (ODA), the development of individuals should be the focus.

Nakamori

I couldn't agree more. The First Ladies of each country, along with Uganda's Prime Minister as the sole participating politician, expressed their desire for assistance in this area. Technical aid from Japan is highly sought after.

Hashimoto

You're absolutely right. If we fail to provide such support, economic disparities will persist, and the future will be grim. Japan should take the lead in offering technical and instructional assistance. For instance, Japan excels in freezing technology, medical advancements, and processing technologies.

Nakamori

I share your agreement. The participating countries are indeed eager for Japan's technological expertise. Prime Minister Kishida also addressed the First Ladies in response to the joint declaration, stating, "Let us collaborate for the benefit of women and children in vulnerable positions." Japan has established multiple processes to

ensure the selection of appropriate support methods and to guarantee safe and secure work. However, it is recognized that the decision-making process can be time-consuming. Nevertheless, Japan has demonstrated its ability to respond promptly in cases such as the desert locust invasion and the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hashimoto

The Summit was an extraordinary gathering where we worked together as "the Mother of Nations." Let us continue to exert our best efforts in realizing the multitude of perspectives shared during this Summit.

Nakamori

We must ensure the continuity of this Summit in our pursuit of securing a bright future for our children. Thank you all very much.


